Divine Liturgy

Sunday, October 31, 2021 **19th Sunday after Pentecost (6th of Luke)**

Tone 2 Troparion (Resurrection)

When Thou didst descend to death, O Life immortal, Thou didst slay hell with the splendor of Thy Godhead. And when from the depths Thou didst raise the dead, all the powers of heaven cried out: "O Giver of life, Christ our God, glory to Thee!"

In truth you were revealed to your flock as a rule of faith, a model of humility and teacher of abstinence. So you won the heights by humility, riches by poverty; O Holy Father Nicholas intercede with Christ our God to save our souls.

Epistle

Read By Reader Nicholas Lezinsky

(2 Corinthians 11:31-12:9) The God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is blessed forever, knows that I am not lying. In Damascus the governor, under Aretas the king, was guarding the city of the Damascenes with a garrison, desiring to arrest me; but I was let down in a basket through a window in the wall, and escaped from his hands. It is doubtless not profitable for me to boast. I will come to visions and revelations of the Lord: I know a man in Christ who fourteen years ago - whether in the body I do not know, or whether out of the body I do not know, God knows - such a one was caught up to the third heaven. And I know such a man - whether in the body or out of the body I do not know, God knows - how he was caught up into Paradise and heard inexpressible words, which it is not lawful for a man to utter. Of such a one I will boast; yet of myself I will not boast, except in my infirmities. For though I might desire to boast, I will not be a fool; for I will speak the truth. But I refrain, lest anyone should think of me above what he sees me to be or hears from me. And lest I should be exalted above measure by the abundance of the revelations, a thorn in the flesh was given to me, a messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I be exalted above measure. Concerning this thing I pleaded with the Lord three times that it might depart from me. And He said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for My strength is made perfect in weakness." Therefore most gladly I will rather boast in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me.

Gospel

(Luke 8:26-39) Then they sailed to the country of the Gadarenes, which is opposite Galilee. And when He stepped out on the land, there met Him a certain man from the city who had demons for a long time. And he wore no clothes, nor did he live in a house but in the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he cried out, fell down before Him, and with a loud voice said, "What have I to do with You, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg You, do not torment me!" For He had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. For it had often seized him, and he was kept under guard, bound with chains and shackles; and he broke the bonds and was driven by the demon into the wilderness. Jesus asked him, saying, "What is your name?" And he said, "Legion," because many demons had entered him. And they begged Him that He would not command them to go out into the abyss. Now a herd of many swine was feeding there on the mountain. So they begged Him that He would permit them to enter them. And He permitted them. Then the demons went out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd ran violently down the steep place into the lake and drowned. When those who fed them saw what had happened, they fled and told it in the city and in the country. Then they went out to see what had happened, and came to Jesus, and found the man from whom the demons had departed, sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. They also who had seen it told them by what means he who had been demonpossessed was healed. Then the whole multitude of the surrounding region of the Gadarenes asked Him to depart from them, for they were seized with great fear. And He got into the boat and returned. Now the man from whom the demons had departed begged Him that he might be with Him. But Jesus sent him away, saying, "Return to your own house, and tell what great things God has done for you." And he went his way and proclaimed throughout the whole city what great things Jesus had done for him.

Updates from the Parish Council

Parish Faithful,

The Parish Council would like to provide a brief update on some activities that we have undertaken over the last month. If you have any questions regarding these items, please reach out to a Council member.

Security Grant Proposal

On August 10, 2021, a group of Parishioners and Council members met to discuss another grant proposal to request funding to upgrade the physical security of the Church. We will be submitting a proposal for the 2022 grant cycle and requesting funds for several projects.

Back Stairwell Cleaning and Reorganization

On August 29, 2021, members of Council cleaned out the back stairwell of the Church removed a sizeable amount of material from it. Much of the material was discarded, and the rest was organized and filed.

Rectory Inspection and Inventory

On September 9 and 11, 2021, members of Council conducted inspections of the Rectory. We verified that the property was clean and in good order. We also conducted an inventory to make sure that all of the Parish-owned furnishings were still in the house.

Mosaic Maintenance

On September 11, 2021, a group of parishioners and parish Council members spent several hours applying two coats of wax to the Mosaic above the vestibule doors. The restoration company recommended that we apply two coats of car wax to the Mosaic every year in order to protect and preserve it.

Meeting with Kunsman Roofing

On September 23, 2021, a member of Parish Council met with a representative from Kunsman Roofing. They inspected the leaks in the hallway between the Church and the Fellowship Hall, the leaks in the Vestry next to the Altar, and the leak in the wall next to the large stained glass window on the south side of the

Church. Kunsman recommended a variety of fixes with a total cost of approximately \$1,800.

Meeting with Dave Phillips Music

On October 13, 2021, a parishioner and a member of Parish Council met with a representative from Dave Phillips music to discuss the following items:

- Replacing the existing microphones for the hall and Church PA systems;
- Returning the hall audio system to functionality;
- Upgrading the current camera setup for the livestream; and
- Upgrading the Church sound system so that one set of microphones will transmit to both the livestream and the Church PA system simultaneously.

The costs to complete the above items will be approximately \$6,000.

Lightbulb Replacement

On October 17, 2021, a member of Council replaced approximately a dozen lightbulbs in the rear staircase behind the Altar and in the hall kitchen.


